Well done to Annabelle Kempe (Preschool), Oscar Zadow (Year 2/3) and Ava Carter (Year 4) on winning prizes! Each class around the school also participated in a variety of lessons looking at the importance of this week. Ask your children about this when you get a chance – I'm sure they would love to share.

Staffing is still underway and I would like to inform our school community that Miss Emma Brands has won a teaching position at Lameroo Community School next year. We thank Emma for her contribution whilst at Tintinara and wish her all the very best. It is also with sadness that we farewell Miss Ellise Ballard next year. Miss Ballard is heading back to the big smoke to be closer to family and loved ones and we wish her all the very best for her future. Both ladies will be sorely missed around the school. Focus Class

YEAR 7/8

This term in HASS, the year 7/8 students have been learning about place and liveability. They have been learning how a places liveability is dependent on environmental, economic and social factors. The topic commenced with a case study of the Lockhart River Aboriginal community to understand how culture and connection to country affects Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's perception of liveability.

Lately, we have been learning about how environmental factors affect liveability and some field work was conducted to make observations around parts of our town. This included what we could smell, hear and see. It was strongly concluded that Tintinara is quite liveable!

We also conducted some field work around our school, analysing volumes of litter in relation to bins, open spaces, noisy classrooms and busy places at break time.




