Years 7-10 Soil Events & Farm walk

Year 7-10 students went on a soil events and farm walk to Mount Charles and attended a presentation by soil experts at Keith Institute. For year 7/8 students, it was an opportunity to deepen their knowledge on soil sustainability. For year 9/10 students, it was an opportunity to deepen their knowledge of the role of carbon and nitrogen in the soil.

The excursion to Mount Charles was very informative, and the institute taught me a lot about matter and soil sustainability

We looked at the different soils and how the crops are affected by salt and the water table. We then went to the Keith institute and learnt about different things. I enjoyed learning about measuring soil and salt levels and how water levels are also measured. - Benny, Year 8

We when to Mount Charles to look at soil and learn about the best soil to grow crops in. Then we went to the hall to listen to a presentation about carbon. - Logan M, Year 8

On the excursion we went to Mount Charles to see the pH of the soil and different types of it. Then we went to Keith Institute and listened to a presentation about the soil pH and the salt in Cooks Plains and see how they can fix it. - Max N, Year 7

On the excursion to Mount Charles and Keith institute we went and looked at the soil and the salt patches in a paddock. We got shown the good soil that has lots of nitrogen and nutrients and the patches that where deprived. In the institute we talked about the lime that they put on the soil and how it was done. -Lucas, Year 9

For our excursion to Mount Charles and Keith Institute we first looked at a weather station that had been set up at Mount Charles. Then we looked at crops and moved onto the low spot in this paddock that had been bare because of soil salinity and salty water sitting there and what that farmer had done to fix it. After that we looked at the type of soils in that area and what that meant for crops as well as the PH and salinity of the water in the ground there. At the Keith Institute people talked about the PH in cropping ground and the nitrogen but also how to change it to what it needed to be. It helped to deepen my knowledge of the soil and sustainability because it was applied in a real-life topic that I understood. I enjoyed looking at the pits and hearing about the different types of soil and PH in that soil. -Logan W, Year 9

A producer at the BBC and mother to a new baby, Tessa is at work in Belfast one day when the news of another raid comes on the air. The IRA may have gone underground in the two decades since the Good Friday Agreement, but they never really went away, and lately bomb threats, security checkpoints, and helicopters floating ominously over the city have become features of everyday life. As the news reporter requests the public's help in locating those responsible for the robbery, security footage reveals Tessa's sister, Marian, pulling a black ski mask over her face.

The police believe Marian has joined the IRA, but Tessa is convinced she must have been abducted or coerced; the sisters have always opposed the violence enacted in the name of uniting Ireland. And besides, Marian is vacationing on the north coast. Tessa just spoke to her yesterday.

When the truth about Marian comes to light, Tessa is faced with impossible choices that will test the limits of her ideals, the bonds of her family, her notions of right and wrong, and her identity as a sister and a mother. Walking an increasingly perilous road, she wants nothing more than to protect the one person she loves more fiercely than her sister: her infant son, Finn.

Riveting and atmospheric, Northern Spy is at once a heart-pounding story of the contemporary IRA and a moving portrait of sister- and motherhood, and of life in a deeply divided society.
