PAT Testing Update

Dear Parents/Caregivers/Families,

In term 2 2024, we are conducting a trial of the new Progressive Achievement Test (PAT) Adaptive format in our school. This will be an alternative to the PAT linear reading and maths assessments conducted in term 3 weeks 7-10.

The PAT Adaptive reading and maths assessments provide students with varying questions as they progress through the various pathways personalised for students. The questions seen by individual students will reflect their last PAT result and their progress through the assessment. Once the assessment has been completed our teachers will have immediate access to the most up to date information about your child's learning. The information provided aligns with the previous assessments, allowing teachers to track learner progress across time. PAT Adaptive is going to be completed during weeks 6 to 7. We thank you for supporting your child's learning.


SRC Term 2 Report

Chickens

It has all been happening in Ag over the last couple weeks In week 10 of Term 1, our chickens progressed out to their outside coop, which gives them more freedom and space (which we made sure was as fox-proof as could be!). The show wethers have also moved into the shelter area permanently and gaining weight very well. They had their first training in Week 1, with most sheep behaving. We will continue their training, as well as the students, to include things like correct animal presentation, how to judge sheep, and how to judge fleeces in the lead up to the Adelaide Show in Week 7 of Term 3.

Show Steers

In the school holidays we welcome our 3 show steers. We have a Poll Hereford from Allendale Stud, thanks to Alastair Day, along with an Angus from TFI Southern Cross, thanks to Martin Ebbs, and a Limousin X from Spark Cattle Co, which is one of my own. These boys have settled in well, and were mostly broken in over the holidays. They have started on a grain mix, which has been designed for us by Anthony Pearce of Hills Farm Supplies. We are very lucky to have his support, as well as the support from the breeders and those families that are supplying grain or hay, so thank you!

Vegetable Gardens

Lastly, the year 3 and 4 class have been very busy planting a selection of vegetables, which we are hoping will grow very well, so that we can have some produce for them to use in Home Ec, as well as sell to school families. They have planted peas, broccoli, cauliflower, and beetroot so far, with lettuce, spinach and carrots to come.

Whilst our senior secondary cohort is small, I would like to take this opportunity to share how flexible SACE can be and how we are making the most of this at TAS. SACE is designed to be achievable for all as there are many different options available to ensure everyone has access to a customised SACE pathway. Whilst not all subjects and combinations can be used to formulate an ATAR, most do, and it is great to see students at TAS striving for an ATAR and studying subjects that both prepare them for their preferred career pathways but are also suitable for university entrance. We have been able to offer these options through a range of means, including directly through our site, Open Access and Distance Education models, which we have proudly partnered with Keith Area School to offer this year. For students wanting to pursue vocational studies, we have been able to support them to enrol in TAFE courses and have been able to build work experience programs into Community Studies courses. Finally, another option is Modified SACE, which can be used for students with additional learning needs and therefore is 100% customisable to individual students. We are proud to be working with our students on an individual level to ensure we can find the best way to offer them what they need to support their pathway and we look forward to seeing what all of them achieve in their SACE studies.

Year 7 Home Ec and Stage 1 Cross-Disciplinary Studies:

Week 1 of Term 2 was a big week for making burgers! As part of their Home Ec studies, the Year 7's have spent Term 1 learning about native Australian ingredients/Bush Tucker. Whilst they made a range biscuits and other baked goods throughout the term using Australian ingredients that derived from plants, they also took this to another level by working with kangaroo meat to design and make their own kangaroo burgers. The students came up with some great burger designs and they did a good job of making them too! They were also pleasantly surprised to find that they enjoyed the taste of kangaroo meat too.

As part of Cross-Disciplinary Studies, our Year 11 student has been learning some of the fundamentals of sandwich making. With the left over ingredients from the Year 7 burger prac, he also took the opportunity during Week 1 to make his own veggie burger, which turned out very well and tasted great. We will be moving on to other types of sandwiches in Term 2 and after the hamburger success, we look forward to seeing him make a range of other sandwiches that might be available in a hospitality setting.

Overall, it was a great experience, teaching us new skills on rock climbing.












Feature Book

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




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
